



De FOMBELLE, Timothee Toby alone



This fantasy world is used as the setting for an amusing and original ecological allegory, as Toby observes our relationship with the environment in a way only a boy his size can. With more than a nod towards Roald Dahl, the story explores the thoughtless behaviour of a greedy individual who is set on destroying the world for short-term profit. Printed on sustainable paper with vegetable ink, the book's important message never gets in the way of a hugely enjoyable coming-of-age adventure. The humorous and thoughtful text retains a feel for the original French and is beautifully



supported by Sarah Ardizzone's evocative illustrations in this award-winning first half of a two-part novel. 10+




WALLIAMS, David The boy in the dress



HEARN, Julie Rowan the strange

As the Second World War breaks out thirteen-year-old Rowan loses control and gives into the sinister demands of "the Voice". His concerned family have him committed to a lunatic asylum, unaware that the staff are performing experimental electroconvulsive therapy. Julie Hearn creates an unusually complex impression of life in the asylum, with both negative and positive effects deftly handled. Of particular merit is her portrayal of Doctor von Metzer, a German doctor who is in charge of the electroconvulsive therapy. Declining the xenophobic stereotyping of the time, Hearn creates an increasingly sympathetic character that develops a crucial positive relationship with Rowan. Rowan's fellow "test cases"

are similarly well-written, creating a lively environment that allows for moments of exceptional beauty. 11+


McKENZIE, Sophie The set-up



Their first mission: to prevent a madman from helping the Nazis to win the Second World War and trigger a global Armageddon. Straddling a wide range of times and places, including a desolate 2066 and Nazi America in 1956, this adventure is exciting and highly readable, with mostly bite-size chapters in the vein of Dan Brown. While unable to entirely avoid the inherent paradoxes and dodgy science of time travel, it nevertheless remains highly entertaining. 12+



Told partly as a novel and partly as a graphic novel, the story is about Blue, who uses the cathartic potential of writing to help him cope with bereavement and being bullied at school. The graphic part of the novel is told in Blue's unique voice and is about a wild kid who lives on a diet of berries and human flesh. It is in this part of the novel that the artist Dave McKean uses the limited colours of green, blue and black to bring the graphic images of the savage to life. Very easy to read, the book succeeds

in being both exciting and very wise and is highly recommended. 10+
